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
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
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### Johnny Blues Man



















#### Kum-Ba-Ya





In this song you will extend your right hand notes to play an A note. See where this A note is on the keyboard diagram. You will play both the G and A notes with your right hand 5th finger.



#### **Half Steps**




An interval is the distance between two notes. The smallest interval in music is the half step. A half step would be the distance from any key to the very next key. If you play any note and then play the next key you are playing a half step.


#### **Your First Chords**

#### **C** Major



A chord is three or more notes sounded together. A major chord has a happy, bright sound. There is an easy way to form a major chord which I call the 4-3 method. By counting up four keys, then three keys, from any note you form a major chord. This is also four half steps and three half steps. Let's form a C major chord:







Start with the middle C note (the starting note is the root note, or name, of the chord), count up four keys (both black and white) this is the E note.

Next count up three keys, this is the G note.

The C major chord contains the notes C - E - G played together. Make sure to use the proper fingers to play the chord most effectively.







#### The Blues Feel

The 12 bar blues you learned had a steady quarter note feel. The blues often has uneven or syncopated rhythms. One common blues feel combines eighth, dotted quarter and quarter notes to create a syncopated rhythm. Play the following rhythm example to understand the feel. The last chord is played with staccato and should be cut short.

Next, you will apply this blues feel to the 12 bar blues using the chord inversions for the F and G chords; make sure to play over the backing track to apply this lesson in a band fashion. The last measure contains eighth notes that should be played with a blues swing feel to them and not played as even eighth notes.
